


Masaryk Square was created in the 1900s as part of the botanical garden in front of the new School of Agriculture. It gained its current form in 2012.


The square got its current form as a result of public competition in 2012.


Concrete paving and a square of amelanchiers.

The **statue** is moved to the edge of the square so that it can create a central place by its direction.

From the neoreneissance geometry of the school I extracted an elliptic shape and created a shallow pool in the center. It can be drained to allow larger gatherings.

Direct connection to the botanical garden is vital and raised pedestrian crossings will support the main pedestrian axis from train station to the main square.






Large facade of the school of architecture was originally the reason for the square's existence. Another important institution is the academy of commerce.


They should be **visible** when you enter the space.

Gleditsia triacanthos 'Skyline' are planted in groups of three so that they do not obstruct the viewing angles and offer a lot of shade.

The concrete slabs from the current square are spread out and rearranged.

But the central area keeps its hard paving as a gathering space and a reminiscence of historical forms. The residual gaps are filled with **cobblestones** present at site and walkable moss.





Amelanchier trees from the current square are also rearranged.

Under all the trees there are heightened **flowerbeds**.

They could be managed by the agriculture school as a part of their education.

There is a great amount of benches that are integrated to the flowerbeds. They allow you to sit, lie down or skate on them.

At the edge there is a place for **food truck** and tables with chairs.

This is a sustainable, multifunctional space full of greenery.
