# ABOUT THE FACULTY

Many courses are offered to students of more than one program, and this mix of students creates an exceptionally rich and interesting learning environment. Not every school is like ours. Sensitive and technical. Strict yet human. Theoretical and practical. Concrete, but warm. Honouring the past, but welcoming the future. Moreover, you will be hard put to find another place where you can experience the same intensity of encounters with the personalities that shape the direction of our architecture and design. Learning by doing is well-reflected in our vertical studios,

where students of all years spend quality study time together.

### Erasmus+ & Exchange Students

CTU's long tradition of teaching architecture is based on exceptional personalities, and most of the heads of the design studios are practising architects. We have over a hundred students in our three English Master's and the Erasmus+ & Exchange programs every year and also employ foreign lecturers and visiting professors. Erasmus+ & Exchange students study in three existing programs: Architecture and Urbanism, Design and, since the 2021/22 academic year, also Landscape Architecture. Incoming mobility students have a looser study plan than full-time students, which means they pick up courses according to their Learning Agreement choice. We publish study plans for Erasmus+ & Exchange students, but the final choice of courses is up to you and your home faculties.

#### **About the Faculty Building**

Either as an architecture, design or landscape student, you all share the same beautiful new building, designed by the famous Czech woman architect Alena Šrámková. Built in 2011, it is

a pleasant space to work in, meet colleagues or just spend time being there. Once you enter the building, you do not feel vulnerable; you feel at home. It is large enough, with a clear floor-plan, three generous interior halls and plenty of space to work in privacy. On the ground floor, there are several lecture aulas holding 80-300 people. There are the study departments, the ArchiCafé and a cloakroom 2 The first underground level has modelling workshops and computer classrooms. The lower of the nine above-ground-floors all have ten studios, four classrooms with audiovisual equipment, meeting rooms, student lounges and a teachers offices; the top two floors have 17 two-storey studios . The numbers of rooms and halls correspond to the building floor levels: e.g. room no. 147 is located on the first above-ground floor, while room no. 648 on the sixth floor.

#### Faculty Building Opening Time

The FA CTU building is open on weekdays from 6:30 a.m. until 10:00 p.m. On Saturdays and Sundays, the building is open from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., and staff and students sign in on the quest book at the reception desk.

# **BEFORE ARRIVAL**

Obtaining a visa for study purposes can take up to 60-90 days

#### Visa

Most non-EU students have to apply for visas to enter and study in the Czech Republic. All essential information and more can be found at the <u>Study in Prague</u> website. You can also contact the <u>ISC Visa coordinator</u>. Please note! When you apply for a visa, the Czech foreign police and Czech consulates require proof of your health insurance, valid in the Czech Republic, before they issue the visa.

#### Health Insurance

For students from the EU, it is necessary to have a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) with confirmation from VZP (public health insurance system in CR). Students from non-EU countries are required to have health insurance from an authorised insurance company licensed to operate in the Czech Republic. For MBD students, UNIQA pojišťovna, a.s. has a contract with CTU and offers students more advantageous health insurance. If you use UNIQUA insurance, the insurance must be paid before enrollment. The essential documents can be found here. The original contract has to be written in Czech (or you have to obtain a certified translation into Czech). The International Office should be informed about any health condition that should be on record (e.g. diabetes).

#### **Accommodation**

Thousands of CTU students are accommodated in one of the many CTU dormitories each year. Each new student is offered a place/bed. The accommodation is basic, mainly in shared double rooms. It is not possible to apply for a single room at the beginning of the year, there may be a room available later during the academic year. If you need to live on

your own, there is an option of getting a double room in a dormitory for 11/2 times the price for a bed in a double room or you can rent your independent accommodation on the open market. The allocation of rooms in CTU dormitories is not the responsibility of the faculty nor of the FA International Office. It is the remit of the SUZ CTU Dormitories and we can only help you with communication. We recommend that you visit the CTU website for incomers. It gives you a fast overview of the process, contacts, prices as well as the regulations and rules that you must follow when you stay in the university dormitory. The ISC Dormitories website also gives you valuable information. Please note! Once you occupy a place at a dorm, your dormitory accommodation agreement includes a considerable penalty if you decide to move out without giving the required notice.

#### CTU Accommodation Scholarship

This scholarship is distributed to every Erasmus+ incoming student & Exchange. You receive the actual amount of money in CZK during the period of your stay at the faculty, divided into two or three payments. The payments are sent automatically to your Czech bank account number that you have registered with the KOS. The FA International Office will inform you about the payment months. We can send scholarship payments only in CZK and only to a Czech bank account number.

#### Legal Framework

It is understandable that there are Study regulations at our school which students are obliged to follow. We highly recommend that you become familiar with them. Among the most essential sets of rules are Code of Ethics of CTU in Prague, CTU Rules of Residence and CTU Study and Examination Rules.

Students register into a dormitory through the SUZ Accommodation application website.

WHITE BOOK The White Book (Bílá kniha) contains detail information about all study programs, including study plans, schedules, course syllabuses, exams, defences, hand-in exhibitions and study regulations. It is e-published at the beginning of each academic year and you can access it in pdf on the FA website.


THE ACADEMIC YEAR The academic year is divided into two semesters: the winter (autumn) semester and the summer (spring) semester. Each semester has 13 weeks of tuition, followed by one week of design studio finalisation and five weeks of exams. The winter semester and the academic year starts in the second half of September and lasts until mid-February, with a week or ten days of Christmas and New Year holidays. The summer semester starts in the middle of February and lasts until the end of June and is followed by two months of summer holiday.

#### Academic Year Calendar

The <u>Academic Year Calendar</u> is published well in advance on the CTU website. In it, you'll see which days are free, the holidays and festivals, and which days have their schedules exchanged (e.g. one Tuesday may substitute a Friday etc.)

#### **Holidays and Vacations**

Czech holidays during the Academic Year are on September 28, October 28, November 17, May 1 and May 8. And there are two extra free days: the Dean 's Day - a day off announced by the Dean of a faculty, intended for home-study, and the Rector 's Day - a day off announced by the Rector of CTU during which university sporting events take place e.g. Vltava boating. Please follow the Facebook International Students FA CTU in Prague to get more information.





#### AFTER ARRIVAL

The ISC Club provides assistance with registering your EHIC at the VZP insurance company during the Orientation Week.

#### Arrival date

Students of Erasmus+ & Exchange programs usually arrive to Prague and get accommodated one week before the semester starts.

#### **Orientation Week**

It is your time to get your bearings in everything you will need in the next many months. You will meet your new colleagues, hear several presentations and may even take some trips. Only some of the events of the Orientation Week are explained in here.

This is the week before the semester starts and is the first week of incoming students' study stay.

#### First Meetina

All faculty incoming students attend a first meeting together. Information about the time and location of this meeting is e-mailed to you by the FA International Office in time. You receive a welcome and then a series of short presentations is given, focusing not only on your studies, but also on your student social life and issues that incoming students have to deal with. You are given useful contacts to people involved in your support and service. The first meeting may last around two hours and includes light refreshments.

#### FA RESTART evening

The first Monday after the semester start, you are also welcome at the FA RESTART evening, held at the Piazzetta usually. You can meet pedagogues and colleagues, take a taste of Czech beer and music and get an idea about how the school community looks and works.

#### Faculty Enrolment Day

On enrolment day, most incoming students visit the faculty for the first time. A student guides you around the faculty building and helps you understand what is where. After the visit, you will be directed to the meet the FA International Office team. You will be provided information on the course registration procedure, on design studios that you can chose from, on the use of sport facilities on the campus, on trips, events, etc. that are offered to you. The aim of this enrolment day is to meet your new colleagues and students for the first time, to sign in, to make notes and ask auestions.

#### Enrolment Procedure of Design Students

There is usually a small group of incoming Design students at the faculty.



All information about schedules, courses and design studios can be found on the faculty website and in the White Book.



Dropping out of courses and making changes is possible only in the first two weeks of the semester as the KOS becomes closed thereafter.

They have an extra enrolment procedure, consisting of also directly meeting some of their teachers. Incoming Design students are informed about the time and location of this meeting in advance by e-mail.

Access into the system KOS Database

### KOS Database and CTU Password

The university student database system is called KOS. After enrolling as a student and registering in the KOS, you receive your CTU username and password. For your initial CTU Password settings you need the code of your study application and your date of birth and then you should change this first password to one of your own. Passwords are renewed every 365 days. How long your current password will remain valid is shown after signing into Usermap in your user profile. If your password has already expired, you can renew it in the Usermap, at CTU Password reset. If you have forgotten your password, contact the FA Password administrator. More information can be found at the university IT Applications and Services website.

#### Student CTU ID Card

Once your name appears in the university student database KOS. you can ask at the Card Publishing House  $\pm 9$  to have your photo taken and be issuted your CTU ID Card. This card is free of charge and gives you access to all university premises including the University Library. It also serves as your discount card at CTU buffets and dining halls. All information concerning the CTU ID Card can be found on ISC Cards website. Please note! We do not issue the CTU ID Card at the faculty, we can only help you navigate around the campus, if you get lost.

#### Enrolling into a course

After logging into KOS with your CTU password, you can administer your Study Plan - seek course annotations, enrol in courses and, in the first two weeks of every semester. you can also drop courses. The best way to enrol into a course is by using its code. Write the code and hit the 'zapsat' button ('zapsat' means 'to enrol'). If you have a problem with enrolling in or dropping courses, stop by during the FA International Office hours. We can also put a grade into the KOS for you if you have a signed confirmation of the grade from the teacher. We are also available to print you a Czech and English study confirmation of KOS, in case you need it.

#### All important information is sent solely to your new faculty fa.cvut.cz e-mail from the second week of the semester on. Your personal e-mail and phone is used only in case of general emergency. All this and much more, especially information about events, trips, parties, exhibitions and emergencies is posted on the FA CTU website, and you can always contact the FA International Office.

#### Faculty E-mail

From the moment of enrolling and registering in the KOS, you are obliged to use your new faculty e-mail address, valid throughout your stay at CTU, for all communication. You will receive all official e-mails through it - from teachers, officials and KOS. If your faculty address is not working, or you have forgotten your password, please contact the FA Password administrator. If you need any more help, stop by during the FA International Office hours.

#### Faculty WiFi

You can connect to the internet at FA by using your Eduroam Password to access the eduroam world-wide wi-fi network, which provides free access to network devices of all participating universities, CTU included. Inside the faculty building you can also use the local FA WiFi network called CTU-FA-Students with the password FAs3xs3x.

Without the CTU ID Card vou cannot enter the

#### Schedules (Timetables)

**Communication Channels** 

The schedules for all the study programs are published on the FA CTU website under the individual study programs. Some courses are scheduled every other week (every even/odd week). Make sure you know which week is currently on. Some of the teachers adapt their courses to the order of weeks within the semester, some of them pay attention to the calendar: the best way to know is to ask your teacher.

#### Erasmus+ & Exchange Study Plans

The Erasmus+ & Exchange Study Plan is published online, updated every year. They cannot be found in the KOS as all other study plans can, because the Erasmus+ & Exchange students are not obliged to follow precisely them. How many credits you need to receive or how many courses you have to sign up for depends on you and your home university rules. You can download the study plan through the faculty website A+U Study Plan (Erasmus+ & Exchange) or Design Study Plan (Erasmus & Exchange) or Landscape Architecture Study Plan (Erasmus+ & Exchange). If you would like to know more about how many credits are required each semester, please refer to the White Book for more details.

#### Courses, Lectures and Seminars

The courses and their syllabuses can be found online, while entering the KOS or in the faculty White Book. You are obliged to attend all seminars.

We recommend that you ask to be excused in advance by e-mail to your teacher if you are not available to attend a particular lecture or seminar. All contacts are accessible through the FA website.

#### **Learning Agreement** Changes

If you need to make any course changes later than during the first two weeks of the semester, and your home faculty agrees and puts a stamp and signature on your learning agreement changes form, we have no objections either. Just come to the FA International Office or send the signed form from your school via e-mail, we will stamp and sign it on our part as well. Remember to inform your teachers about this change as well.

#### **Design Studio Enrolment**

We have over 35 vertical studios, in which students of the second to the fifth year work together and foreign students are fully mixed with Czech students. We are proud to have some of our best practicing architects, as well as foreign visiting professors, leading our design studios. Each studio is led by two architects or designers and has around 24 students enrolled. The topics are published by the studio leaders a week before the semester starts on the faculty website and posted on the pink board on the ground floor In the week before the semester starts. a public design studio presentation is usually held in one of the large lecture halls, according to an invitation mailed to you in advance. Teachers present prepared topics and their studio one after the other. We strongly

recommend staying until the very end when the teachers tell you when and where they are available for the first meeting. Thereafter, you attend the first meeting of the design studio you have chosen. You have the right to choose your studio, but the teacher has the right not to accept you. Some studios are overloaded with students; some do not accept foreign students due to language or topic problems, while others receive a majority of foreign students. It may take you more than one meeting to be accepted into a studio. After you have been accepted, you will fill in a special form to enrol in the studio, given to you and signed by the teacher. You hand this into the FA International Office and we activate your entrance to the design studio room, where you can keep your belongings and study anytime during faculty opening hours. In the event a problem with entering the room persists, please contact the IT department . More information

can be found on the <u>Architecture and</u> <u>Urbanism Studios</u> website and the Design Studios website.

#### **Moodle Online Support**

Most teachers use the university

Moodle application for online teaching support. Some of them use MS Teams or Zoom, some use Skype or just e-mail as well. At the beginning of a course, you will be given the key for entering the online study system. You log into Moodle with the CTU password but you need a special password to log into certain courses. Only the teacher knows the course password; we cannot help you with that.

Before visiting the workshops, read the obligatory Instructions for students.



You have to print out the form on the ground floor of the library and then show your ID card as well as your valid CTU ID Card at the main desk on the 2nd floor.

### Computer and Modelling Rooms

The faculty computer rooms are called GAPPA and are located in the basement, accessible via the circular staircase. One of the computer rooms is continuously open and serves as a 24-hour Study Room. Please note! Students are not permitted to watch films or videos on the school WiFi nor to download movies.

The modelling workshops are open to all the students of all study programs and are all located in the basement. The large workshop room no. S113 is accessible by the Middle Hall spiral staircase, while the small workshop and casting and modelling shop are accessible by the Right Hall straight staircase.

#### Libraries

#### National Library of Technology

The National Library of Technology is the round building opposite FA. It is the largest and the oldest library of science and technology literature in the Czech Republic, with a collection of over 1.5 million volumes. It provides an ideal environment for studying with 1,322 places to study and 562 places to relax. It also offers individual and team study rooms, classrooms, reference services, self-service print/scan/copy services, and an After Hours Study Room.

#### CTU Central Library

The CTU Central Library is located on the first floor of the National Library of Technology and more or less blended into it. You will need your student card to enter through the entrance in the foyer on the ground floor. When you reach the first floor vestibule, you will stare in awe at the beauty, space and light of this building. If you want to borrow a book, use the library databases, reserve a study room or make copies, you have to register.

#### FA Reference Library

The FA Reference Library of the Department of Theory and History of Architecture and the Department of Architectural Conservation is located on the 7th floor of the faculty building. It contains a number of noteworthy and very rare titles, including unique volumes of the work of Viollet-le-Duc. The library also offers leading domestic and international periodicals, as well as a whole range of new publications and documentary films with contemporary and historical themes.

#### Mixing with Czech Students

Thanks to our system of vertical design studios, you will be fully integrated with Czech students roughly 30% of your course time and more if you choose more than one design studio. Most Czech university students have an excellent or very good knowledge of English, but some are quite shy and feel awkward speaking it. You will find that this is a common trait in all Czech people. Don't give up, talk slowly and clearly, smile, and you will see their shyness melting and their warm heart and sense of humour appearing. Remember that Czech people do not appreciate superficial small talk relationships, they first have to trust you as a person before they start a real dialog.

#### Field Trips and Kruh

Architecture and landscape students visit buildings and landscapes. Design students visit production facilities and exhibitions. Field trips are usually announced by the course teacher (meeting point, time, duration) or the ISC club for various trips that are not a part of the study plan. Some architecture or design studios groups organise workshops in <u>Kruh</u>, where the faculty has an old heritage-protected farmhouse called Tuláčkův statek, used as an education centre.



The FA NONSTOP week 24/7 precedes the Studio Project Exhibition. It is a beautiful house with the steep hills of the Krkonoše (Giant Mountains) in the background. Other studios sometimes travel to other locations, or for international workshops, that they advertise at the beginning of the semester.

#### Design Studio Project Exhibition

The last week before the submission deadline is called the FA NONSTOP (design studio charrette week) and the building is open nonstop for seven consecutive days for 24 hours per day. The exhibition lasts for two consecutive weeks. Czech and international students present at the same time, which makes the exhibition a good place for socialising. Since June 2020, due to the coronavirus lockdown, the <u>Submission of the Studio Project</u> is done also via a <u>Gallery of Studio Projects</u>. All the dates are announced in the <u>Academic Year Calendar!</u>

#### **Diploma Defence Day**

The day of the master's degree diploma defences is another important date, given in the <u>Academic Year Calendar</u>. The diploma defence is accompanied by an informal evening party. There are

typical traditions connected to this event usually takes place in the Left Hall in winter (January) and outside on the Piazzetta in summer (June, occasionally September).

#### **Graduation ceremony**

A formal graduation ceremony (promoce) for bachelor's, master's and doctoral graduates and their relatives takes place in the university Bethlehem Chapel, in the Old Town of Prague, and is held roughly four times per year. You are welcome to visit this beautiful old gothic chapel and see this traditional ceremony, but only if you dress up and stand in the back of the aula. The exact dates can be found in the <u>Academic Year Calendar</u>.

#### Yearbook

The documentary record of the students` past academic year is published in English and Czech every September. On over 300 pages it presents all programs, departments, design studios and first year ZAN studios. It also includes an overview of published books and a list of all the current year graduates of our alma mater. Available at the Dean's Secretariat for 100 CZK.

#### **Transcript of Records**


At the end of each semester, transcripts are issued at the university rectorate. Erasmus+ students are asked to contact <u>CTU International Office</u>. In order to issue you your transcript, it is necessary to have all your grades registered in the KOS. If some of them are missing, please inform the course teacher by e-mail and send a copy of your request to the <u>FA International Office</u>. The teacher will grade you, and we will register the grade into KOS. If you have not fulfilled the assignment required to get a grade, you will be unfortunately graded F - fail. To avoid this, communication with teachers, attendance at lessons and adhering to deadlines is strongly recommended.

#### **Credits**

You should know the number of credits you are obliged to obtain from your home faculty. For example, Czech outgoing students need to obtain at least 20 credits per semester to pass into the following year. In case you are not able to gain enough credits due to some misfortune, please let us know in advance. There are additional solutions and we can help you find them.

#### **Confirmation of Stay**

You may sometimes need other documents signed by the <u>FA International Office</u>, such as the Confirmation of Stay, in which your period of stay is officially given. In this case, contact us by e-mail: <a href="mailto:internationaloffice@fa.cvut.cz">internationaloffice@fa.cvut.cz</a>.



#### **OTHER SERVICES**

#### **Sports**

The Institute of Physical Education and Sport ÚTVS (Ústav tělesné výchovy a sportu) is an autonomous workplace of the university and can be found at Pod Juliskou 4, Praha 6 #9. They offer various sport activities and trainings in many different disciplines at all possible levels. If you want to register into any sport course, you have to log in, choose your course, and register. Please note! We can register your TVV and TVV0 courses in KOS for you, but we cannot register you for PE classes. For other inquiries please contact directly the Contact person for foreign students.

#### Eating

#### Menza University Canteens

The main student university canteens are called Menzas. All are run by the SUZ. The closest to the faculty is Menza Bechyňova, the other is Menza Technická, a smaller one is in the Masarykova dormitory \$\frac{1}{2}\$. The menus and their prices for all the SUZ Menzas in Prague are published weekly on the SUZ CTU Menzas Menu website.

#### ArchiCafe

This is the small bistro on the ground be guite pleasant to have a delicious sweet or savoury breakfast or snack in it, sitting next to its large glass facade, or even outside, taking in some sun or just relaxing.

#### Mega Buf Fat

This is a slightly larger bistro, located on the ground floor of the Civil Engineering faculty  $\stackrel{1}{\Longrightarrow}$ . It offers a wide selection of vegetable and pasta salads, soups, simple warm foods, dairy, fruit, deserts, drinks, teas and coffees.

#### Cafe Prostoru

This is located on the ground floor of the National Library of Technology building  $\stackrel{1}{\downarrow}$ , with a wonderful summer terrace. There is a simple lunch choice of warm food and plenty of delicious cold food and drinks on offer. The Café Prostoru Menu is published weekly and guess what! It is only in Czech!

#### Other eateries

There are two restaurants within a ten-minute walk from the faculty, in the direction of Santinka náměstí. There is a Vietnamese restaurant close to Evropská street and a Country Life bistro close to the main Vítězné náměstí (Victory Square). There are several other restaurants and cafés, bars and pubs located in the Dejvice quarter. A more expensive restaurant called U Matěie with great Pilsner beer and outside seating under old chestnut trees is at the Matěj church close to the famous Baba housing area. There is a local food shop on Santinka square. There are several shops along Jugoslávských partyzánů street, and a lot of fresh vegetables, dairy products, fish and meat can be bought in the spring to autumn season at the Saturday morning Farmers' Market in Kulaťák (Vítězné náměstí).



#### TRANSPORT AND PARKING

#### How to reach the Faculty

The faculty is situated on the CTU campus in Prague 6, and you can reach it on foot, by bike, by several public buses, tram lines, a metro line or by car. It is located 20 minutes by car and 40 minutes by public transport from the Václav Havel International Airport. At the same time, it is within walking distance of Prague Castle and is 20 minutes by public transport from Prague's historical centre. While travelling from the centre, get on metro A or tram no. 20 or 26 to get off at the Thákurova stop (1) or Dejvická stop (2). From there it is about 10-15min to the faculty building. Or take tram no. 18 to Lotyšská stop (3) and walk 6min. The Masarykova dormitory is a 5min. walk away; the Strahov dormitories are connected with the campus in five stops and 10min. by bus 143 (4). Other tram and bus lines connect the campus with other Prague areas.



The Dejvická stop is on the Metro A line, which is the fastest east-west connection through Prague.

#### Public Transport and Travel Pass

You can find all the necessary information about the contact points, fares, timetables, restrictions and more on the <u>Prague Public Transport</u> (Dopravní podnik hl. m. Prahy). For your travel pass you will need a photo and to fill out a form. When you come to the International Office we will put a stamp onto the travel pass confirmation sheet so that you receive the student fare in the event you do not have an international

ISIC card. We can also help you to decide which zones you need to pay for.
